- Dissertation: *“Knowledge First” and Its Limits*
I explore three ways of making precise the popular idea of putting “Knowledge First” in epistemology. First, we can focus on the concept of knowledge and our linguistic practice: this can give us insight into our thinking, but should not be mistaken as justification for metaphysical claims. Second, we can take our intuitive judgments as good prima facie evidence for metaphysical claims. This is the approach implicit in Timothy Williamson’s original proposal for “Knowledge First Epistemology”, but it struggles to find explanatory resources for the apparent disparity of our intuitions. Finally, we can take a hint from Edward Craig and focus on the primary purpose of the concept of knowledge, which I argue is to evaluate information. This allows us to characterize knowledge as a social kind and thereby explain our linguistic practices, find grounds for epistemic rights, and explain the paradox of skepticism.
